
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DIR. KATHRYN FERGUSON IRELAND | 97 MINS | 2022

Nothing Compares is the story of Sinéad O'Connor's phenomenal rise to worldwide fame and how her iconoclastic personality resulted in her exile from the pop mainstream.

Nothing Compares charts Sinéad O'Connors phenomenal rise to worldwide fame, and examines how she used her voice at the height of her stardom. Focusing on Sinéad's prophetic words and deeds from 1987 to 1993, the film presents an authored, richly cinematic portrait of this fearless trailblazer through a contemporary feminist lens.

The archive-led documentary features era-defining music videos and concert performances alongside previously unseen footage from this period. The film is underpinned by a new interview with Sinéad

herself, in which she reflects on events in her own words, and from a present-day perspective. Intimate first-hand contributor interviews add to the tapestry with additional insights from contemporary artists, musicians and social commentators introducing broader themes of Irish history, politics and global activism, all the while reflecting on Sinéad's artistry, impact and legacy. After travelling all over the world with this film, we welcome director Kathryn Ferguson back to her hometown, and she will particpate in a post-screening Q&A.

DIR. PENNY LANE USA | 96 MINS | 2021

For our closing night event, Penny Lane, one of the most interesting documentary makers in the world, will be joining us to present her new film.

Listening to Kenny G takes a humorous but incisive look at the best-selling instrumentalist of all time – and quite possibly one of the most famous living musicians. The film investigates the artist born Kenny Gorelick – who took the pop charts by storm with his 1986 breakthrough single, "Songbird" – exploring his talent for playing jazz so smoothly that a whole new genre, "Smooth Jazz," formed around him, and questioning fundamental assumptions about art and excellence.

The film explores his controversial standing in the jazz canon – along with insights from fans and critics alike.

A long time friend of the festival, we are delighted to finally welcome Penny to Belfast, after screening many of her films in previous years, most notably the infamous discussion that followed our screening of *Hail*, *Satan?* in 2019. Penny has been making award-winning, innovative nonfiction films for over a decade. And yes, Penny Lane is her real name.


DIR. KIM LONGINOTTO



DIR. CHARLIE SHACKLETON UK | 82 MINS | 2022

Fragments of hundreds of films from around the world bring together an ensemble cast of actors with one thing in common; each is no longer alive. Together, they contend with a fragile existence lived solely through these traces of their work.

The Afterlight itself exists as a single 35mm film print. Further eroding every time it screens, the film is a living document of its life in circulation. Eventually it will disappear entirely.

Charlie Shackleton is one of the best proponents of archive material working in documentary, having made such interesting works as Beyond Clueless and Fear Itself, amongst many others. Original cinematography by Robbie Ryan.

The film follows the journey of Kitty, the imaginary friend to whom Anne Frank dedicated her diary. A fiery teenager, Kitty wakes up in the near future in Anne Frank's house in Amsterdam and embarks on a journey to find Anne, who she believes is still alive, in today's Europe. While the young girl is shocked by the modern world, she also comes across Anne's legacy.

This is absolutely not a documentary, but we wanted to experiment with showcasing a film that is very much inspired by documentary, whilst remembering that director Ari Folman's Waltz with Bashir is one of the best (animated) documentaries ever made.

Centered around an epic scale model of the solar system designed by the artist Oliver Jeffers with scientist Professor Stephen Smart, Our Place in Space is a three-dimensional sculpture trail, interactive AR app and exciting learning and events programme that will run all across Northern Ireland in summer 2022.

As part of Docs Ireland, Oliver Jeffers has selected his favourite documentary - Apollo 11. Oliver will introduce the film and has this to say about it:

"With a rare match of stunning 60's film footage and over 11,000 hours of audio recordings heard over the waves at the time... I find Apollo 11 breathtaking... I find it painstakingly emphatic. It's a beautiful film that showcases an emotional human crescendo of the greatest engineering achievement of the modern era – one that I believe has set the poetic tone of perspective ever since."

DARREN ARONOFSKY IN CONVERSATION

As part of The Nerve Centre and Unboxed's Our Place in Space, award-winning filmmaker Darren Aronofsky ('Black Swan') will be in conversation at the QFT, discussing what drove him to create One Strange Rock - his ten part documentary series which explores the fragility and wonder of planet Earth - one of the most peculiar, unique places in the universe. A screening of one of the episodes will precede the interview.

One Strange Rock (Available on Disney +) Hourlong episodes delve into monumental events such as genesis, cosmic violence, human intelligence and alien life, oxygen, and survival vs. destruction, while host Will Smith guides viewers on an unprecedented exploration, bolstered by an elite group of eight astronauts.

Darren Aronofsky is an American director, producer, and screenwriter. Widely known for his thoughtprovoking and intelligent filmmaking, Aronofsky makes films that are often regarded surrealistic and disturbing. In 1998, Aronofsky made his first feature film, the psychological thriller 'Pi'. He went on to write and direct some of the most controversial films in recent years, including Requiem for a Dream, the Oscar nominated 'Black Swan', and 'The Wrestler'.

Marilyn Hyndman was a cornerstone of the arts and film-making sector in Northern Ireland for many years, she inspired generations of artists, musicians, film-makers and activists across a broad spectrum of equality issues.

Through her work with Dave Hyndman, Northern Visions and NVTV, she supported hundreds of individuals and communities across Ireland and the UK, with training, hands-on practical guidance and support.

In 2004, Marilyn and Dave Hyndman set up the community television station, NVTV. Their vision was one of a "democratised form of media, where new technologies are utilised as a tool for expression and creativity, to effect social change and combat poverty, social exclusion and isolation." Enabling thousands of stories to be told, stories which otherwise would never have been heard. Documentary production has been central to the work of the station since it's inception.

In 1996, Marilyn published a book, *Further Afield: Journeys from a Protestant Past*, it is a collection of 40 accounts of what life is like for working class

Protestants who do not fit the traditional mould. The book made a significant contribution to political debate in Northern Ireland.


Tragically, after a short illness, Marilyn Hyndman died in January of this year. As a tribute to her memory and to the important contribution she made to documentary in this country, Docs Ireland will screen the first documentary Marilyn made, which was broadcast by Channel 4, *Under the Health Surface: As Told by Belfast Women* (Ch4 1986) and the last programme she directed *Nature's Haven* (NvTv 2022). The screenings will be introduced by Marilyn's friend, and former Director of Development at Belfast City Council, Marie-Therese McGivern.



DIR. ADAM LOW NORTHERN IRELAND | 90 MINS | 2022

Ulysses is the most notorious novel of the 20th century. Banned in the USA for obscenity in 1920, it was finally printed in Paris in 1922 by an American woman who had never published a book before.

A hundred years since it first appeared Adam Low's Arena: James Joyce's ULYSSES unlocks Joyce's masterpiece in all its surprising, poetic, moving, verbose, sexually explicit and endlessly hilarious glory, from its earliest crossed out manuscript pages to the final iconic edition, bound in the blue of the Greek flag in honour of Homer's The Odyssey. Notoriously difficult to read and written in a bewildering variety of styles, it revolutionised the modern povel

What is the worst thing that you could ever hear from an ex? How To Tell A Secret explores the act of disclosure of being HIV positive and the stigma that drives people to withhold their status.

Based on a theatre show, the stories in this film move between bodies of young men, migrant women, drag artists and activists. A form-flipping documentary, it features a cast of actors as well as ordinary people coming out on screen for the first time.

This is a highly innovative documentary co-directed by Anna Rodgers, a previous Docs Ireland Shorts award winner.


DIR. KIM BARTLEY

Pure Grit is both a thrilling tale of extreme bareback horse racing, and an intimate love story.

Chronicling three years in the life of a young Native American bareback horse racer, her unwavering determination, and the relationships that sustain her. In the stunning Wyoming wilderness of the Wind River reservation, Sharmaine and her new girlfriend Savannah begin to build a life for themselves. Sharmaine sees the potential for a fresh start, but life, like the race track, doesn't always go according to plan.

DIR. ALAN GILSENAN IRELAND | 101 MINS | 2022

A tri-lingual Feature Documentary.

An Buachaill Geal Gáireach is the remarkable and untold story of a song. An Irish song called The Laughing Boy written by a teenage rebel called Brendan Behan in memory of another iconic rebel, Michael Collins - the centenary of whose death is commemorated this year.

But this song also had an extraordinary and dramatic afterlife as *To Gelasto Paidi*, the powerful left-wing anthem of resistance against the dictatorship that ruled Greece in the late Sixties and early Seventies. Translated by the poet Vassilis Rotas. Behan's words in Greek were set to music by

the legendary Mikis Theodorakis, the most famous Greek composer of all time. The song remains an enduring and potent cultural force in the heart of Greece today.

As poet Theo Dorgan says in the film, both the Irish and Greek versions of the song capture something unique: "...Some idea, perhaps, of the eternal rebel, some embodiment of revolt against small destiny, tyranny, the forces that tend always and everywhere to diminish if not actually crush our sense of the necessary largeness of life and the imagination..."

Penny Lane has been making award-winning, innovative nonfiction films for over a decade. This includes five features (including *Hail Satan?*, *NUTSI*, *Our Nixon*, *The Pain of Others*) – most recently *Listening to Kenny G*, an HBO Original Documentary which premiered at the 2021 Toronto International Film Festival. A 2020 Guggenheim Fellow, Penny has been honored with mid-career retrospectives at the Museum of the Moving Image, San Francisco DocFest, Open City Documentary Festival and Cinema Moderne.





DIR. SARA DOSA USA/FRANCE | 90 MINS | 2022

Intrepid scientists and lovers Katia and Maurice Krafft died in a volcanic explosion doing the very thing that brought them together: unraveling the mysteries of volcanoes by capturing the most explosive imagery ever recorded. Along the way, they changed our understanding of the natural world, and saved tens of thousands of lives.

Previously unseen hours of pristine 16-millimeter film and thousands of photographs reveal the birth of modern volcanology through an unlikely lens - the love of its two pioneers.

The archive footage in this film is truly remarkable, a gift to our collective eyes, and absolutely a must to see on the big screen. One of the biggest documentaries of the year, the film has won awards at festivals all across the world

DIR. ED PERKINS
UK | 100 MINS | 2022

The story of Princess Diana is told exclusively through contemporaneous archive footage creating a bold and immersive narrative of her life and death. Turning the camera back on ourselves, it also illuminates the profound impact she had and how the public's attitude to the monarchy was, and still is, shaped by these events.

From the Academy-Award and Emmy winning producers of *Man on Wire, Searching for Sugar Man* and *LA 92* and the Academy-Award nominated director of *Black Sheep* and *Tell me who I am.*

Like all good archive films, it lets the archive, and the characters within, speak for themselves. This allows the audience to project their own thoughts and experiences onto screen. The film is then able to address wider issues - about misogyny, about Empire and class, about how the UK has changed since the 1980s, and how it hasn't.

Film will be followed by exclusive pre-recorded Q&A with the film's director.

A different kind of true crime film, this is one full of fun and twists - including a great portrayal of the subject by Alan Cumming.



DIR. ROBERT WIEDE USA | 127 MINS | 2022

Kurt Vonnegut: Unstuck in Time is a dazzling, worthy tribute to Vonnegut and a compelling introduction for the uninitiated.

It is a deep, immersive dive into the author's upbringing and his creative output. It spans his childhood in Indianapolis, his experience as a Prisoner of War in World War II, his marriage, family, and divorce, his early careers as a publicist for General Electric and a car salesman, and his long years as a struggling writer, leading to eventual superstardom in 1969 following the publication of his lightning-bolt anti-war novel *Slaughterhouse-Five*. The film began 39 years ago when young, fledging filmmaker Robert Weide (known for his hilarious work on *Curb Your Enthusiasm*) wrote a letter to his literary idol proposing a documentary on Vonnegut's life and work.

As always with someone who was such an amazing chatshow guest - a hilarious and wonderful documentary ensues.


Director Samaher Alqadi picks up her camera as a form of protection and begins documenting the growing women's rebellion, not knowing where the story will lead her.


DIR. PAWEL LOZINSKI POLAND | 100 MINS | 2021

This Rain Will Never Stop takes the audience on a powerful, visually arresting journey through humanity's endless cycle of war and peace.

The film follows 20-year-old Andriy Suleyman as he tries to secure a sustainable future while navigating the human toll of armed conflict. From the Syrian civil war to strife in Ukraine, Andriy's existence is framed by the seemingly eternal flow of life and death. Told in a unique and sometimes experimental fashion - this beautiful film shows life inside Ukraine rarely seen before, and a sad premonition of what was to come.

DIR. HA LE DIEM VIETNAM | 90 MINS | 2021

Di is a 13-year-old girl living in a village lost in the mist of North Vietnamese mountains. Di belongs to the Hmong ethnic minority, where traditionally women get married very young, some of them from the early age of 12.

In this society, marriage is linked to a very particular and controversial tradition: the "bride-kidnapping". When a boy is interested in a girl, he organises her kidnapping before forcing her back to his own home. On some occasions this process turns dangerous and dark. Herein, with some of the most difficult to watch sequences of documentary I have ever seen, we learn a lot about modern, and ancient, Vietnam.

We'll show how the Whole Picture Toolkit was created with industry, to combat causes of poor mental health, taking participants through easy actions and changes to implement, and showcase other work in this space designed to combat issues including bullying, harassment, poor working practices, and lack of training.

The intention of the session is to start a conversation about mental health in the industry, the stigma around talking about it and getting help, and the problems it causes, whilst also opening up to discuss how we can all work better, demand more. and most importantly improve the conditions and culture which are contributing to this mental health crisis in our industry.
