













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DIR. ALISON ELLWOOD Northern Ireland/USA | 95 MINS | 2023

Let the Canary Sing is an immersive journey into the world of a unique voice. Cyndi Lauper hit the big time in 1983, and she's been in the public eye ever since – as a singer-songwriter, actor, activist and most recently best-selling musical composer.

Now for the first time, Cyndi is throwing open the doors for a premium feature documentary to reveal the secrets of her fifty-year career. Using a treasure trove of archival material that will take us back to the start of the story in Queens, New York.

Diaries, personal photos and unreleased versions of songs will trace Cyndi's story then and now.

A knockout conversation between Carl Frampton and Patrick Kielty on Northern Irish politics, education and identity.

Patrick and Carl have long been two of Northern Ireland's most interesting men - both have skilfully moved from their very successful first careers into the wonderful world of docs. What has resulted is some of the most revealing and honest documentary work being made about the North.

They will use this work as a prism through which they discuss their experiences and their viewpoints on their shared homeland. We will encounter opinions on mental health, masculinity, the Good Friday Agreement, integrated education, along with their love of sport.

Carl "The Jackal" Frampton turned pro as a boxer in 2009, and the Northern Irishman quickly climbed the ranks, winning both IBF and WBA belts. Carl

retired from the ring in 2021 and is now a prominent supporter of local charities. As a Protestant married to a Catholic and with two young children, he is determined to be a role model for the future of Northern Ireland. His new BBC doc, *Carl Frampton: Men in Crisis*, was broadcast in May 2023.

Born in Dundrum, Co. Down, **Patrick Kielty** began his stand-up career as host of Northern Ireland's first comedy club, The Empire Laughs Back, in a pre-ceasefire Belfast. Recently, he has won awards for his documentaries *My Dad, The Peace Deal and Me*, and *Patrick Kielty: 100 Years of Union.* Patrick's new radio talk show can be heard every Saturday morning on BBC 5Live. 2023 saw the release of the feature film *Ballywalter* in which Patrick stars in the lead role alongside Seána Kerslake.

DIR. GARY LENNON 78 MINS | 2023

The photographer without a camera.

Gambit Pictures is proud to present the World Premiere of *I Dream in Photos* which explores the life and work of photographer Cathal McNaughton. Filmed over three years, we will see what inspired Cathal to create his breathtaking 25-year-long body of work and why he quit "the best job in the world" aged just 40: shortly after winning the ultimate accolade in his industry – the Pulitzer Prize.

Certain photographs, certain images, have left a huge legacy on the world. Cathal's award-winning career shows he is someone who has been blessed with a gift to take photographs that have this power. His overarching aim is to "give a voice to those that do not have one". But this gift is also a curse. The demands that it has taken on his wellbeing and relationships are substantial.

DIR. GARRY KEANE AND STEPHEN GERARD KELLY 92 MINS | 2023

From the makers of *Gaza* (Sundance 2019), comes a new cinematic odyssey that penetrates deep below the surface of Beirut, a still beautiful, yet deeply troubled city on the brink of financial collapse.

In the Shadow of Beirut weaves four compelling storylines together in a searing portrait of a people and a city on the brink, yet who possess unmistakable qualities of resilience and hope.

Through intimate, character-driven storytelling, the stark reality of life for the protagonists of the film is symbolic of many thousands of others who fight for survival in a city, once described as the Paris of the Middle East, but now boasts the highest refugee numbers in the world. A city and a country that many are now desperately trying to flee.

The film is brutal and at times heartbreaking, but ultimately beautiful in the connection that it forges with its subjects, which co-director Stephen Gerard Kelly achieved over a six-year period. We are also delighted to welcome back director Gary Keane, who won the inaugural Pull Focus Award for Best Irish Documentary at Docs Ireland 2019.

Docs Ireland is very excited to be hosting the European premiere of this brave and powerful new film.

DIR. MARGO HARKIN 106 MINS | 2023

Stolen tells the story of how women who had the misfortune to fall pregnant 'out of wedlock' were treated in an Ireland that was heavily influenced by the Catholic Church.

Over 80,000 unmarried mothers were incarcerated in mother and baby institutions run by religious orders from 1922 to 1998. Most were cruelly separated from their babies after birth. Many of the children were adopted within Ireland and abroad – rendered untraceable and unaware of their birth story. Others were fostered out as cheap farm labour from the age of six, often in circumstances abysmally devoid of care and love. 9,000 infants died in these institutions from 1922 to 1998, a rate that, on occasion, was five times the national average infant mortality rate.

Survivors reveal the shocking details of their treatment in a scandal that sparked a government inquiry into the fate of unmarried women who fell pregnant in 20th-century Ireland.

DIR. CARA HOLMES 70 MINS | 2023



Needing to make a living she turned to sheep farming, with the hopes of continuing her art on the side. Instead, she discovered the beauty of sheep and developed an ovine obsession. The film covers a year spent on Barry's farm and examines how unexpectedly the lines between shepherd and artist can be blurred.

Notes from Sheepland is an engaging and unconventional portrait of an unconventional artist. Director Cara Holmes conjures beautiful images from the flock. The serenity of the visuals is complemented by the dynamic score, ranging from a horn player who haunts the fields to the Wexford Male Voice Choir who appear in the stables. The film is a true celebration of the rituals and values of farming life.

"Notes from Sheepland has a streak of light, playful wit. There is also something of a lament about the film. What happens in this shepherd's little corner of Ireland becomes a reflection of global events and challenges for everyone." Screen Daily

DIR. FRANKIE FENTON 83 MINS | 2022

Atomic Hope follows a tiny global movement of unpopular pro-nuclear activists, who strongly believe we need nuclear power in order to decarbonize our energy systems and avoid calamitous climate change.

Filmed over a ten-year period, these advocates for nuclear energy come from all over the world. Their opponents cite nuclear meltdowns, extortionate construction costs, radiation fears and nuclear waste as indisputable reasons to reject this technology. The pro-nuclear crew take on these arguments urging scientists, citizens and policymakers to take a sober look at the science, halt the mass closure of nuclear power plants and fully reconsider nuclear energy as a viable solution to imminent catastrophe.

The film uncovers the deep-rooted controversy, hatred and conflict associated with the subject, and just what it takes to be an activist for nuclear power in today's climate-conscious world.

With a focus on identity, memory and the thorny issue of nationalism, at its heart *The Future Tense* centres around the filmmakers' relationship to Ireland, and their adopted home, England. Through reflections on personal and social history, *The Future Tense* explores the osmosis between England and Ireland, at this most critical and politically charged of moments. Including the saddest donkey in Ireland.

Christine and Joe have made many fine movies in their careers, including 2019's fiction piece, *Rose Plays Julie, and Further Beyond*, one of the best Irish documentaries of the previous decade.

DIR. MARTIN STALKER AND JAMES GLANCY 107 MINS | 2023

James Glancy, a filmmaker and former British Royal Marine commando who was decorated for his actions in combat, returns to Afghanistan with a small, handpicked team to help him answer the question that has haunted him for ten years. Was it worth it?

Dramatically, mid-way through filming, President Joe Biden announces that the US would be pulling troops out by 9/11, starting a Taliban offensive that leads to the dramatic fall of the Afghanistan Government, amidst chaotic evacuation scenes in Kabul, as American forces withdraw.

This broad investigation into both Afghanistan's history and its present is able to hint at the influence and issues related to colonial interests. It is a unique insight into day-to-day life, in and away from the country's many conflicts.

DIR. DENNIS HARVEY 74 MINS | 2023

Floating between Ireland, Spain, Chile, Sweden, France and Bangladesh over seven years, *I Must Away* follows four migrants who have each left home to rebuild their lives abroad.

Narrated by a series of letters from the director to his grandmother, the film is a kaleidoscopic vérité essay which disentangles roots, land and identity and explores the unequal distribution of rights and privileges, in our age of migration.

DIR. MAURICE O'BRIEN 86 MINS | 2023

An enigmatic artist becomes obsessed with transforming The Wall of Death, a century-old fairground motorcycle spectacle, into a place of Art, risking life and limb.

This documentary tells the unlikely story of a Glaswegian visual artist, Stephen Skrynka, who dreams of transforming the traditional fairground motorbike attraction into an art form, but underestimates the difficulties of combining his artistic vision with the realities and brutality of the wall. Facing a crisis of money and self-belief, salvation arrives in the shape of unexpected comradeship, anonymous donations and the kindness of strangers.

During the winter of 1969, young boys started to disappear off the streets of Belfast, never to be seen again.

By 1974, as 'The Troubles' were reaching a bloody and vicious peak, five boys in total had vanished from within a five-mile radius of each other.

After a 5 year investigation, *Lost Boys* pulls at the threads of these unresolved disappearances to unfold an extraordinary untold tale of abuse, murder and potential cover-up that asks serious questions of the British state and its intelligence operations in Northern Ireland.

DIR. CIARA NIC CHORMAIC 70 MINS | 2023

Ó Bhéal is a cinematic exploration of the rise of Hip Hop and Electronic artists in Ireland embracing oral traditions of folklore, ancient poetry and sean nós singing to create a new fusion sound, a culture clash through music. An ensemble piece, featuring Irish language rappers Seán 'Mory' Ó Muirgheasa and Oisín Mac, producer and multi-instrumentalist Fehdah, and Limerick rapper Strange Boy. This beautiful film delves deep into these four artists' process and how they are breaking new ground in Irish music.



THE MEN WHO WON'T STOP MARCHING

DIR. ALISON MILLAR

NORTHERN IRELAND | 59 MINS | 2008

The film will be followed by a Q&A with Alison and the films subject, viral internet star Jordan McKeaq.

In 2008 Alison Millar spent a year filming the marching bands of the Shankill Road. Amongst the men she follows is Jordan, an eleven-year old aspiring drummer.

Millar discovers a mixture of entrenched prejudice, relief that the troubles are over, nostalgia for the days of paramilitary discipline, and a battened-down resistance to talking about the past. There are tender moments in the film too - revealing the trauma attached to the past, exploring Jordan's relationship with his father.

THE FATHER, THE SON & THE HOUSEKEEPER

Buried under concrete and controversy on the outskirts of Dublin lie the remains of Ireland's infamous 'Singing Priest', Father Michael Cleary. He had two best selling albums and topped the bill at the Sydney Opera House and the Stardust Club in Las Vegas.

Well-known for his staunch Catholic views on sex, divorce and abortion, it became clear after his death that he had lived a contradictory 'secret life'. In 1991, as a student, Alison Millar moved into Michael Cleary's house and started filming him observationally. This film is the story of the secret life of a man who fooled her, his family and an entire nation.

Work-in-Progress Screening


For over 50 years, the most extraordinary footage ever filmed inside the IRA disappeared. BBC journalist Darragh MacIntyre found the original 16mm film canisters in New York. We follow him as he tries to unravel the mystery surrounding how and why it was made.

During the most violent period of the Northern Ireland Troubles in 1972, an odd documentary team turned up in Belfast: the man asking the questions was an American academic and artist, the Israeli director had been arrested trying to kidnap a Nazi war criminal. None of them had any real track record in making documentaries, but they were given exceptional access inside the IRA.

Darragh tracks down some of the IRA men who were featured in the film. And one of the original production team who, even though he was the music composer, was present at shootings and bombings filmed by them in Northern Ireland.

This BBC NI documentary is still in production, but we will be screening excerpts. Afterwards John O'Kane and Darragh MacIntyre will take part in a Q&A to describe this film's extraordinary journey.

DIR. ALEX HOLMES UK | 97 MINS | 2023

The unbelievable story of cyclist Greg LeMond, who came back from the brink of death after a hunting accident to win the closest race in the history of the Tour de France.

With innate talent, an earnest, ethical approach to competition, and an affable, boy-next-door charm, the American Greg LeMond was a popular presence in European cycling. A wizard on the steady, gruelling climbs of the Tour de France, LeMond propelled himself to recognition with wins first for the National Team of France, and then unexpectedly for himself in 1986, when a yellow jersey win shocked and thrilled the world (turning some "friends" into adversaries). Alex Holmes' poignant documentary makes space for LeMond, with the aid

of his extraordinary wife Kathy, to share a deeply personal journey through trauma and the twists and turns of fame and performance amidst immense public pressures. This is a resounding reminder that LeMond represents the world of athletics at its best, and replays one of the greatest comeback stories in sports history. LeMond remains the only US cyclist to ever win the Tour de France.

DIR. PENNY LANE USA | 105 MINS | 2023

Director Penny Lane's decision to become a "good Samaritan" by giving one of her kidneys to a stranger turns into a funny and moving personal quest to understand the nature of altruism. *Confessions of a Good Samaritan* is a provocative inquiry into the science, history, and ethics of organ transplantation, asking an ancient question in a whole new way: Who is your neighbour, and what do you owe them?

From Penny - Confessions Of A Good Samaritan is an offbeat and provocative inquiry into the science, history, and ethics of organ transplantation. It is also my personal passion project and the hardest film I've ever tried to make. At first, I was reluctant to make a film about this deeply personal and emotional experience, but eventually, I realised I had a unique chance to make an interesting work of art that will also save lives (so I got over myself).

Did you know that 13 Americans die every day awaiting a kidney transplant? That's the bad news. But the good news is that if just 1 in 10,000 people could be inspired to give a kidney, the waiting list would be eradicated immediately. This is what motivates me. My film will share the truth about what it was like to donate a kidney to someone I'll never meet. In trying to answer the simple question, "Why?", I will bring viewers on a fascinating journey through the neuroscience of altruism, the history of surgery, and the future of organ transplantation.

Penny Lane is one of the most interesting documentary makers in the world, and it's our pleasure to again bring her new film to Docs Ireland.

DIR. PAUL SNG UK | 90 MINS | 2023



Driven by a commitment to document the impact of deindustrialisation on working class communities in Northeast England in the 1970s and 1980s, Tish Murtha used her camera to expose societal inequality. She felt she had an obligation to the people and problems within her local environment, and that documentary photography could highlight and challenge the social disadvantages that she herself had suffered. However, despite early acclaim for her work, she was unable to make a living from photography and died in poverty.

With Tish's daughter Ella the film sets out to ask: who was Tish Murtha and why did she not receive her due? What does her work tell us about the value society places on working-class communities and working-class artists?

DIR. SIMON CHAMBERS UK | 90 MINS | 2022

Reluctantly taking on the task of caring for his dying actor uncle, filmmaker Simon embarks on a 5-year odyssey of craziness, frustration and ultimately awareness.

His cantankerous uncle David wants Simon to help him have the perfect end to his life. Amongst the squalor of mouse shit, peeing in jam jars, and a house full of hoarded rubbish, David wants to play a final 'King Lear'. Simon tries to curb David's urge to give his 'kingdom' away. Despite a house fire, homelessness, delirium from an infection, and the dreaded 'care home', together they create an awardwinning final performance to send David on his way.

DIR. KIM LONGINOTTO & FRANKY MURRAY BROWN UK | 90 MINS | 2023

In 2018, a young musician from rural Jamaica called Dalton Harris became the first black man and foreigner to win "The X Factor" UK and, with it, a record deal that promised to transform his life. Filmed over four years, this coming-of-age documentary follows Dalton as he struggles for fame, love, and acceptance whilst battling dangerous allegations about his sexuality and spiraling mental health.

Charting an extraordinary rise, the film follows Dalton's new life in London. The film explores the constant homophobic death threats he receives because of assumptions of his sexuality and the added stress of trying to keep his career afloat in a foreign country where all friends and family are out of reach. Gradually, Dalton starts to write more

personal, revealing lyrics and becomes more open about his ongoing battle with his mental health. He tries to come to terms with his difficult upbringing and the fear and shame he experienced growing up in a very homophobic atmosphere in Jamaica.

The film is an inspirational story and a celebration of musical excellence. It is also filled with Kim Longinotto's usual sensitivity, insight and meaning about the world we all inhabit.

DIR. PATRICIO GUZMÁN CHILE | 83 MINS | 2022


"October 2019, an unexpected revolution, a social explosion. One and a half million people demonstrated in the streets of Santiago for more democracy, a more dignified life, a better education, a better health system and a new Constitution. Chile had recovered its memory. The event I had been waiting for since my student struggles in 1973 finally materialised."

One day, without warning, a revolution exploded. It was the event that master documentarian Patricio Guzmán had been waiting for all his life: a million and a half people in the streets of Santiago, Chile, demanding justice, education, health care, and a new constitution to replace the strident rules imposed on the country during the Pinochet military dictatorship. Urgent and inspired, *My Imaginary Country* features

harrowing front-line protest footage and interviews with dynamic activist leaders and powerfully connects Chile's complex, bloody history to contemporary revolutionary social movements and the election of a new president.

Documentary Master Guzman's skill is on display from the first frame. His unique interviewing style somehow always accesses the emotional, his drone shots are far from the cliched norm. But as always, the highlight is the incredible and searing action on the streets at political demonstrations - something he almost invented on film in *The Battle for Chile* (1973).

DIR. SUSANNE REGINA MEURES GERMANY | 98 MINS | 2022



Millions of followers are at her feet, and companies shower her with products. When Leonie's parents recognise the enormous economic potential of their daughter's online activities, they quickly take over her management. They want Leonie to have a better life than they had. But Leonie's life dictated by brands and pressure to produce content, slowly turns into a prison.

This is an insightful, and sometimes incredibly sad, look at how corporate social media companies have weaved their way into our lives.

DIR. AHSEN NADEEM USA | 97 MINS | 2022

Ahsen Nadeem originally wanted to make a film about "marathon monks" belonging to a secretive Buddhist sect in Japan who reach enlightenment through highly determined feats of strength.

Instead, his own life kept getting in the way. Through walking the tightrope of keeping his devout parents happy and living his own life, he has caught himself up in a web of lies and deception. Now that he is engaged to the woman he loves, someone his parents do not know exists, Ahsen wants to come clean. *Crows are White* is a quirky and funny film which follows Nadeem as he travels to Mount Hiei where he believes he will find enlightenment of his own, but instead finds friendship in the only monk willing to talk to him, the rebellious heavy metalloving monk, Ryushin.

Delightfully shot and featuring a distinctive and moving score, the film never feels narcissistic or self-indulgent, but authentic and heart-warming as it finds connection in the least likely of places.

In Burkina Faso, in the gold-digging site of Bantara, Rasmané, 16 years old, descends more than 100 meters deep in artisanal mines to extract gold. Anxious about accidents, Rasmané makes his way in this world of fierce adults in the hope of one day becoming emancipated.

This is a peaceful, beautiful film that allows space to consider both the micro work of Rasmané and his friends, but also the macro world of global finance and resource extraction.

Chased by the army, two Bedouin cousins smuggle undocumented workers through the Middle East. A breath-taking portrait of human trafficking in one of the most dangerous regions of the world.

The Devil's Drivers has the white-knuckle suspense of a 1970s car chase thriller while also immersing us in life under occupation. Filmmakers Daniel Carsenty and Mohammed Abugeth filmed over eight years, following the drivers Hamouda and his cousin Ismail who are Palestinian Bedouins in the town of Yatta. They are motivated by the basic human desires to provide for their families and watch their children grow. They savour each day of freedom knowing it could be their last.

The film documents the way Israeli soldiers treat any Palestinian in transit as a potential terrorist. Israeli agents actively recruit informers, causing ripples of suspicion throughout the community. Soldiers pressure Palestinian villagers to erect blockades on their property or face the penalty of having their homes destroyed.

This observational documentary film follows Bobi Wine and his wife Barbie. Bobi rises from the ghetto slums of Kampala to one of the country's most loved superstars. His musical talent lifts him and emboldens millions of previously voiceless people. Bobi uses his music for activism, then becomes an Independent Member of Parliament to stand to defend the rights of his people.

Bobi's wife, Barbie, by standing with him, plunges her own life into uncertainty. The film is an examination of the disturbing misuse of the legal and parliamentary systems, two supposed pillars of democracy. The country's institutions are controlled by the State to ensure President Museveni, an autocratic strongman, who has held power since 1986, continues to rule Uganda. Bobi and Barbie must risk everything, their lives and their futures to

challenge him. This is not just a story for Uganda, it is a narrative for all those who struggle under dictatorial regimes. This story has never been so relevant.

Directors Statement - Bobi and Barbie are once-in-a-lifetime heroes who take great personal risks to dislodge and liberate a nation from a regime that has been in power for 35 years.

As documentary filmmakers, occasionally, we are fortunate enough to be given the opportunity to relate events that can instigate transformation. We believe that this is one of those occasions. In a world which presently feels more tyrannical than ever, we have a duty to celebrate those who stand against violence and offer hope in the face of autocracy.

In the darkness of a smoke sauna, women share their innermost secrets and intimate experiences, washing off the shame trapped in their bodies and regaining their strength through a sense of communion.

Winner of a directing award at Sundance 2023 - Smoke Sauna Sisterhood is a deeply moving, intimate and breathtaking approach to issues of trauma, healing, and community. Filmed almost as if a Vermeer or Rembrandt painting, the camera is never intrusive, never mechanical. 



Satoko is a young woman who struggles with overcoming her trauma from the disaster. On the other side of the ocean, on the Hawaiian island of Kaho'olawe, a group of volunteers are gathering to clean the beach from Japanese tsunami debris floating in from the Ocean. They are all sharing the stories of the afterlife.

This dreamy, wandering film drifts like the plankton it so meaningfully describes.







For his feature debut, legendary director Apichatpong Weerasethakul took a camera crew across Thailand and asked villagers from all walks of life to come up with the next chapter in an ever-evolving story.

The crew imagines and films these instalments and pairs them with vignettes of their authors. Schoolchildren, boxers and street vendors all contribute to this tale, with their individual takes on what should come next creating a kaleidoscopic portrait of storytelling and Thailand at the turn of the 21st century. Shot on 16mm over two years, and rescued from its temperamental elements by Martin Scorsese's World Foundation, *Mysterious Object at Noon* is a strange and unpredictable film that announced Weerasethakul as a filmmaker to watch.

Note from assistant programmer - The best documentaries are those that challenge the very notion of the form and toe the line between fiction and non-fiction; Docs Ireland is keen to explore this easily-dissolved boundary. We selected this classic documentary for its playful depiction of 'reality' but also for its powerful sense of compassion and empathy for the storytellers. In our time of oversaturated culture that is marked by stories being sold to specific demographics and statistics, it is refreshing to see a film celebrate the communal nature of sharing a story.





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
